These rules are not identical to State rules published in other Competition Handbooks, or by the Division of Fairs and Expositions of the California Department of Food and Agriculture.

1. All Livestock Exhibitors are required to have themselves and their animals available to parade or be on exhibit, as requested by Fair Management. Failure to properly show or parade animals selected by the Superintendent in charge will result in forfeiture of premiums.
2. **NO DOGS ARE ALLOWED ON THE FAIRGROUNDS.** Guide or service dogs, dogs in competition, or as part of an exhibit, entertainment program, or demonstration and 4-H dog show entries are the only exceptions. Any dog found in the livestock barns will be subject to removal by State Fair Security or Animal Control, and the exhibitor subject to disqualification and/or loss of premiums.
3. All animals in the livestock barns must at all times be properly cared for, and be thoroughly groomed and clean when presented in the show ring, all animals are required to be fit and groomed in a manner that is acceptable within the prevailing show ring policy and/or trend as set by the breed association or species. The Fair reserves the right to withhold premiums and/or disqualify stock that are not, in their judgement, in suitable condition.
4. Exhibitors must appear in an attire appropriate to the show ring and to a formal competition. They must be as clean

and neatly groomed as their animals. Management reserves the right to bar from competition or excuse from the show ring any exhibitor whose attire is inappropriate or unkept. No smoking shall be allowed in the show ring. All livestock must be clean and neatly groomed as well.

The California State Fair has implemented ShoWorks, an online entry program. ShoWorks is an industry standard used by over 50 fairs nationally. This user-friendly program can be trusted to accurately enter you into our competitions and allows for efficient communications via e-mail. We are excited to have ShoWorks to better facilitate entering California State Fair competitions. Enter online at **CAStateFair.org**. Once you have submitted your entries online, print the Detailed Receipt Page, obtain all required signatures and return the signed form to our office by the required deadline. Entries are not accepted until Detailed Receipt (formerly known as the Signature Acquisition form) is returned. All entries hand delivered or mailed may be subject to a \$25 per exhibitor fee. Rules & Requirements

Ownership & Registration Papers

1. All entries must have been owned by the exhibitor for at least 30 consecutive days prior to the opening of the Fair. Animals that are leased by exhibitor are not eligible.
2. Animals entered as individuals in the Junior Department are not eligible to be entered in classes of the Senior Department (unless otherwise noted). See General Rule 18.
3. All animals in "breeding animal" divisions must be registered and recorded with the breed association in the exact name of the exhibitor (owner) as declared on the entry form, except:
 - a. For pigs under 12 months of age and still owned by the breeder, litter registrations are acceptable if recorded with the breed association and if they identify the litter by birth date, sire, dam, and ear notching.
 - b. Exhibitors whose breed association requires an inspector's approval prior to registering may present a statement by the secretary of the association that the animal is otherwise eligible to be registered if the statement identifies the animal by birth date, sire, dam, and ear tag, tattoo or notching and the animal will not be over 12 months of age on the opening day of the Fair.
 - c. Breeding partnerships or co-owned animals must be verified by names listed on original registration certificates provided by the breed association.
 - d. All junior show rules shall apply with regards to breeding partnerships.
4. Original Registration Certificates, including a Duplicate of an Original Registration Certificate **issued by a breed association**, or other documents mentioned above, Items a. through c., must be presented to the management when the animals arrive on the fairgrounds and must be available on request at any time. Photocopies or other duplicated copies of original documents, letters, telegrams, etc., **are not eligible**. Clerks are instructed to correct entry records exactly as shown on the certificate. All registration papers must be inspected and approved by the State's representative before entries are allowed to be judged.
5. All sheep entered in the Natural Colored Wool Sheep Division, must be accompanied by a certificate of individual registry from the NCWGA or at any other breed association issuing these registrations on colored sheep. Natural Colored Wool Sheep must only be shown in the Natural Colored Wool Sheep Division, these sheep may not be shown in any other division.
6. No deviation from or alteration in the information on a registration certificate will be permitted unless clearance in writing is first obtained from the breed association and presented with the certificate. Evidence of any attempt to alter information on a registration certificate shall be reported immediately to the Division of Fairs and Expositions and the appropriate Breed Association(s) and shall result in the disqualification of that exhibitor.
7. When the owner and breeder names are not exactly the same on the registration certificate, a statement from the breed association verifying that the various names are recognized as the owner and/or breeder, including owner's mailing address, must be presented to the State Fair Livestock office before awards can be paid
8. Animals may not be entered or shown in more than one breed division unless specific show rules allow for such (i.e. Junior Brown Swiss entries showing in Open Brown Swiss classes due to the nature of the show). All animals must be shown in the breed division in which they are entered. Further more, an animal is eligible to enter and compete in only "one" breed classification regardless if the animal is registered in one or more breed associations or registries. The animal must also be registered in the recognized U.S. Registry for their breed classification or if registered in country of origin outside the U.S., the animal must be eligible for registry in the recognized U.S. Registry.

Animal Identification

1. All animals (except barrows) shall be identified by a permanent number (ear tag, legible, easy-to-read tattoo, brand required by breed association, or ear notching) on the animal and recorded on the entry form. The State Fair shall provide number tags for Market Gilts and Barrows. When identification numbers are in both ears and the numbers are different, both numbers shall be recorded

on the entry form. (Official California calf hood brucellosis vaccination eartags, plastic orange, are acceptable; brucellosis vaccination tattoos are not.) All animals with ear notching or tattoo identification (i.e. tattoo, ear notch, tag, etc.) is required to be listed on the official breed association registration papers. The I.D. information on the animal must match that which is listed on the registration paper in order for that animal to show. Further requirements may result from the USDA National I.D. Program.

2. An exhibitor may not use the same permanent marking on more than one animal of the same breed and sex during any 5 month period for swine, and two consecutive calendar years for sheep, or any 12 month period for all other livestock, except that all pigs in one litter may be marked the same.
3. For barrows and market gilts an identifying marking will be placed on or attached to the animal by the fair and must be on the animal at all times or awards will not be paid.

Veterinarian

1. Livestock exhibitors will be responsible for all veterinary fees applied to their animals. The state may at it's sole discretion require an autopsy of any animal that may die while on the fairgrounds. Autopsy fees will be the responsibility of the exhibitor.
2. Removal of animal tissue other than hair or wool from any livestock unless performed by the state's designated veterinarian is considered a violation of rules and the state's animal welfare policy. Violators shall be sanctioned and reported to authorities.

Judging

1. Any exhibitor and/or junior exhibitor's family member, fitter and/or agent who has outstanding financial accounts with the California State Fair will not be allowed to enter or exhibit at the California State Fair or participate in Sale of Champions.
2. No exhibitor shall receive more than two cash awards in any one class. For the purpose of this rule only, a husband, wife, and unmarried children (including foster children) under 18 years of age shall be considered as being one exhibitor, except that brothers and/or sisters shall be considered as being separate exhibitors in Junior Department classes. This

rule shall have no bearing on consideration in the placing of entries by judges. Ribbons shall be presented in the order of placing by the judges. The managements shall, however, pay third money to fourth winner, etc., when the third winner is prohibited from receiving third cash award under the provisions of this rule. (Any entry or exhibit in which one or more members of the family described above has a financial interest shall be included in the limitation of not more than two cash awards per class.

3. Management reserves the right to combine or to divide classes in a manner it deems necessary in order to assure adequate competition. In breeding classes where age classes are combined or divided after the closing date, Rule 2 above shall be applied on the basis of classes entered rather than classes shown. In the event of a show change, as a result of this rule, or where classes are established after the close of entries, premiums and awards will be distributed, divided or eliminated in a manner as deemed necessary by Fair Management.
4. The judge may disqualify any animal that is not sufficiently gentle to be shown with safety. The judge may not award premiums to any animals which show visible evidence of disease, deformity, or lameness. No award will be made to entries eliminated under this rule.
5. No children will be allowed to show or be present in the show ring with mature, breeding age boars.
6. Any animal upon which artificial means have been used to permanently remove or remedy physical defects will be barred from exhibition. This does not apply to training of horns.
7. Each entry shall be assigned an entry number by the Fair Management. Exhibitors must wear their numbers while showing their animals as required by Fair Management.
8. Exhibitors who make entries in group classes are required to lead out those groups at the scheduled time or forfeit their premium money for that class.
9. The judges decision shall be final. The judges decision may not be protested.

NOTE: Exhibitors that qualify to compete for California State Fair Supreme Champion Drive must participate in the Supreme Champion Competition. Exhibitors that choose not to participate in Supreme Champion drive will forfeit all premiums and awards.

Stalling/Pens/Tie Outs

1. Pens and stalls will be assigned by the Fair management. Space may not be traded without approval of supervisor in charge. No altering of pens or stalls is allowed without similar approval. Wheat Straw shall be used for bedding for all animals (beef, sheep, dairy cattle and dairy goats) exclusively. No rice straw, sand, sawdust, shavings, wood chips or rice hulls are allowed in the livestock area. Animals' pens must be bedded at all times. No large watering troughs allowed in the livestock area. Animals housed in L3 during Junior Livestock Week, July 8-11 and July 21-24 may use shavings instead of wheat straw. Exhibitors must clean their pens and alleyways before obtaining a release.
 - a. Stalling Request Forms will be available on-line. Requests will not be taken over the phone, on Detailed Receipts or post it notes. Only one Stalling Request Form will be accepted per exhibitor. Requests are not guaranteed.
2. Stalls, pens and animals must be neatly kept and supplied with necessary clean bedding at all times. Pathways and approaches must be kept clean for the convenience and safety of spectators. All fans, tack boxes, blocking chutes/tables and any other equipment/supplies must be kept within the tie or pen space, not in pathways or approaches or any area(s) other than those designated for tack, equipment and animal(s). **NO EXCEPTIONS.** The number of fans may need to be limited per exhibitor or animal based on space available. Stalls, pens and aisles must be cleaned by 8:30 a.m. each day. Failure to adhere to these safety and cleanliness rules may result in disqualification or forfeiture of premiums. Fans and electrical cords in aisles or other public walkways will not be permitted.
3. The Fair does not provide wheelbarrows, or tools for cleaning (pitchforks, shovels, brooms, etc.)
4. No nurse cows are allowed in the livestock barns. Recipient or host cows with embryo transfer calves must be identified, and must match the I.D. number on the Transplanted Embryo Certificate provided by the breed association. This certificate must be presented with the calf's registration papers. The natural mother may be brought for a nursing calf

entered in the show.

5. All personal belongings must be placed out of sight during hours the Fair is open. During this time no sleeping shall be permitted in barns. No minors may sleep in the barn at any time.
6. Cattle Tie Outs: Rules, regulations and procedures will be posted during the fair. All exhibitors must adhere to these rules or be subject to disqualification.
7. **POLICY FOR 2016:** Cattle may be tied out at 6:30 p.m. daily and not before. Tie-out time will be strictly monitored by management. Exhibitor's that do not adhere to this schedule shall have all premiums forfeited. It is recommended that neck ropes be used in the tie out areas. Cattle placed in the tie-outs are done so at the exhibitor's own risk. It is the exhibitor's responsibility to clean tie-out area prior to departure from the California State Fair.

Bedding

1. All Species will use "wheat straw" for bedding. No other bedding material is allowed. Swine exhibitors may use shavings, however they must clean out the pens prior to obtaining release.
2. **First bedding will not be provided.**
3. Open division cattle shall be stalled together as much as possible by breed (i.e. Angus with Angus, Brangus with Brangus, etc.). Cattle having registration papers with more than one breed association/registry shall be stalled with the breed in which they enter. In cases where exhibitors may be showing two or more breeds, consideration will be given on a case-by-case basis.

Blocking Chutes/Blocking Tables/Generators/Port-O-Cools

1. **POWER GENERATORS:** No Generators will be allowed within the livestock pavilion. All generators must be operated outside the pavilion and must be stored out of site when not in use.
2. Generators: there is a \$35 permit fee for all generators on grounds. Portable electric generators whether owned, rented, or borrowed, which are operated by an exhibitor at the California State Fair, must be equipped with GROUND FAULT INTERRUPTER (GFI) outlets. **NO EXCEPTIONS.**

3. Port-o-Cools require a \$35 permit fee. The \$35 fee will be paid the day of arrival at the Livestock Office. The State Fair reserves the right to limit the number of Port-o-Cools per exhibitor.
4. Blocking Chutes, tables and generators will each require a fee to be on grounds. These fees should be registered when completing your online entries. Generators will be \$35. Blocking Chutes are \$25. Blocking Tables are \$15.
5. A post registration fee of \$35.00 will be charged for each blocking chute and/or generators registered and paid for after the official entry deadline. All Blocking Chutes, Blocking Tables, and Generators must be registered with the Livestock Office. The State Fair reserves the right to limit the number of blocking chutes and generators per exhibitor and to regulate their location. Upon arrival to the Fair, a numbered I.D. tag will be assigned and attached to blocking chutes, blocking tables, and generators. Spaces may be assigned. No blocking chutes or generators will be allowed in spaces other than those assigned by the Barn Supervisor. Failure to keep blocking chutes and generators in assigned locations or those missing I.D. tags may result in disqualification and/or loss of premiums. Blocking Chutes and Generators must be moved when blocking any pedestrian areas.
6. A post registration fee of \$15.00 will be charged for each blocking table registered and paid for after the official entry deadline. All Blocking Tables must be registered while on the Fairgrounds. The State Fair reserves the right to limit the number of blocking tables per exhibitor. All blocking tables must be registered with the Livestock Office. Upon arrival at the Fair, a numbered I.D. tag will be assigned and must be attached to the blocking table. Spaces will be assigned if necessary. No blocking table will be allowed in spaces other than those assigned by the Barn Supervisor. Failure to keep blocking tables in assigned locations or properly identified shall result in disqualification and/or loss of premiums. Blocking Tables must be moved when blocking any pedestrian areas.

Fitting and Showing

1. To maintain a high degree of confidence in the livestock show, the California State Fair reserves the right to disqualify any animal(s) and the owner/exhibitor of that animal(s) that have been fitted in an unethical manner. Unethical fitting shall include any injection of gas, solid, or liquid under the skin (or mammary system) to alter the normal conformation. It shall also include any cutting or tearing of the hide or underneath the hide or removal of tissue in an attempt to alter the shape of the animal. It shall also include attempts to disrupt or change normal dental development as well as dyeing or coloring the individuals which alters their natural coloration; including artificial tail heads or polls. Other specific violations include but are not limited to: liquid diets for lambs; excessive shrinking; excessive exercising; tying animals with their front feet off the ground; showing animals with their front feet off the ground; not allowing animals to eat or drink for extended periods of time; icing animals down; using dog pinch collars on any animal for any reason; electric stimulation; breaking of tails; the balancing of an udder and/or teats by abnormal means; physical abuse; and any attempts to change the degree of firmness of any individual shall also be considered unethical. Artificial means of filling cattle internally is prohibited. This shall also apply to violations of the California State Fair's residue avoidance program.
2. The showing of unethically fitted livestock or livestock of any ineligible age for exhibition in the class entered is prohibited. Unethical fitting will be deemed to consist of any method altering the natural confirmation of any part of the animal's body, including, but not limited to, airing, injections, operations or other tampering with the animal's natural confirmation or the illegal or improper use of drugs.
3. Animals showing signs of having been operated upon or tampered with for the purpose of concealing faults in natural confirmation or with the intent to deceive relative to the animal's age, soundness or physical appearance will, in the sole and absolute discretion of the Livestock Exhibit Supervisor, be disqualified. As a condition precedent to the participation in the Junior

- Livestock competition, every exhibitor must agree to submit any animal so entered to inspection by a licensed veterinarian appointed by Fair management, and agrees to have such animal submitted to any tests as may be designated and requested by the veterinarian, and agrees that the conclusions reached by the veterinarian shall be final and unappealable, without recourse against the veterinarian, the California State Fair or any of its officers, directors or employees.
4. No change of the natural color pattern of the animal by painting or dyeing will be allowed.
 5. Exhibitors will be required to fit and groom their animals in fitting areas designated by the State. Fitting areas will have specific boundaries and schedule limitations. Exhibitors not following these specific policies will be disqualified. Blocking Chutes and/ or Trim Tables will be assigned specific locations. Blocking Chutes and Trim Tables not registered with the Livestock Office or those that are placed in unapproved locations shall be removed without warning and at the exhibitors expense.
 6. Any species division (breeding show only) with less than 20 head entered by less than 3 exhibitors at the close of entry deadline (June 17) will be transferred to the specie's All Other Breed division. The premium amount from the original division will not transfer to the specie's All Other Breed division. All exhibitors will be contacted by management to verify if the exhibitor would like to continue their participation in the specie's All Other Breeds division or the exhibitor will be offered the option to have the original division entry fee's refunded.
2. No animal will be released before the scheduled release time. Releases will be scheduled beginning at the time listed in the Competition Handbook with releases being given to those exhibitors traveling the furthest distance first. Specific schedule of releases to be determined by Fair Management. Emergencies requiring early release, such as a sick or injured animal, will require proof in the form of a Veterinarian's certificate.
 3. Exhibitors that arrive after official arrival time, as scheduled in this Competition Handbook, may be subject to the following:
 - a. Some or all entries may not be allowed to show.
 - b. Pens or ties may not be available.
 - c. A penalty of up to \$100.00 per exhibitor may be assessed and must be paid prior to judging.
 - d. A charge for veterinary fees for health examinations may be assessed to each exhibitor and must be paid prior to judging
 4. RELEASE: All livestock will be released according to the schedule as outlined in this Competition Handbook. Those traveling the furthest distance will be released in order based on distance from the fairgrounds. For example; out-of-state and exhibitors living 300 miles or more will be released first with those living closer to Sacramento released in groups based on distance to return home.

THE STATE RESERVES THE RIGHT TO LIMIT ENTRIES BASED ON AVAILABLE SPACE AND IN A MANNER IT DEEMS APPROPRIATE.

Show Schedule, Arrivals, and Releases

1. Each exhibitor shall be expected to show animals in accordance with the schedule for judging as printed in the Competition Handbook or posted. Schedule is subject to change by the management, and such changes will be posted at the Livestock Office. Judging will not be delayed for exhibitors entering the show ring late. Any exhibit not presented promptly at the scheduled time will be ruled out and barred from competition in the class in question.

Photographs

Photographs of any livestock entry or livestock exhibitor may be taken by the Official State Fair Livestock Photographer(s). Exhibitors must make themselves and their livestock available for the taking of photographs. The official photographs become the property of the California State Fair. Exhibitors may purchase photographs from the Official Commercial Photographer. All Champions and Reserve Champions are required to have a photograph taken by the official photographer(s). The State reserves the right to publish for its intended use, any and all photographs taken on the Cal Expo Grounds. Participants and their families, advisors and leaders approve the reprinting or publishing of any photo taken on the fairgrounds upon signature of entry.

Code of Ethics

1. The California State Fair, as a member of the Western Fairs Association and the

International Association of Fairs and Expositions is uniting with other member fairs in an effort to support ethical and humane treatment of all animals exhibited at the Fairs as well as reinforcing the educational emphasis of competitive programs for animals and maintaining the highest integrity standards of all participants. The California Exposition & State Fair has adopted the I.A.F.E. Show Ring Code of Ethics Guidelines for our Livestock Shows and reserves the right to disqualify any animal or exhibitor that has violated those specific guidelines. The Dairy Shows will abide by the Purebred Dairy Cattle Association (PDCA) Show Ring Code of Ethics for all dairy breed shows and pledges its full cooperative support for its enforcement to show management, show judges, and the national breed associations. A copy of the codes are available upon written request.

2. Should contractors, associations, clubs or individuals desire to arrange for beverages and food services, all such arrangements must be coordinated through Ovations/Spectra, the State Fair's Master Food & Beverage Contractor. No exceptions. Contractor shall be responsible for expenses related to these services, if any. Alcoholic beverage service areas/facilities will only be allowed for in designated locations. Only persons 21 years or older will be allowed to consume alcoholic beverages. Further, no alcoholic beverages may be brought onto the grounds. These products may only be acquired at Spectrum locations on the grounds. Individuals that endanger themselves or others, will be reported to the authorities.

Protests

1. Any protest must be made in writing and submitted to the Ag Programs Manager; the protest must be made within 8 hours of the cause of the protest. Any protest submitted after the exhibitors are released will not be considered. All protests must be signed and accompanied by a deposit of \$200.00 (cash, money order or certified check) payable to the California State Fair. The deposit shall be forfeited if the protest is not sustained.
2. Protest must be based on a violation of rules and must state plainly the cause of complaint or appeal and set forth the facts relied upon or rule violated and must include the names

of a minimum of two (2) supporting witnesses, including their phone numbers (both temporary while at the Fair and permanent) upon whom proof is to be made.

3. Judging procedures will not be interrupted for protest investigation; and depending on the basis of the protest, a decision may be withheld until a thorough investigation and if necessary, a hearing is completed. No complaint or appeal concerning a judge or judge's decision will be considered.
4. Protest shall be adjudicated by the Fair management. Fair management will consult with a member of the board of directors who shall be designated by the Chairman of the Board of Directors. The decision of fair management shall be final and unappealable.
5. All questions of dispute or differences not provided for under the rules and regulations shall be referred to the Ag Programs Manager whose decision shall be final.
6. Any animal that is involved in a protest is eligible to compete until the protest is resolved. Any classes which involve a protested animal will not be officially placed until the protest is resolved. In any Championship classes involving that animal, the judge shall also select a 1st and 2nd Reserve Champion, in case of disqualification.

Definitions

The following definitions apply:

Registered Animal - An animal which is recorded with a recognized governing or registering association.

Purebred Animal - An animal the breeding of whose sire and dam traces directly to registered animals of the same breed.

Grade Animal (except for Dairy Goats) - An animal whose sire is registered or purebred and whose dam is of unknown or mixed origin.

Recorded Grade Dairy Goat - All animals registered Experimental (Blue Border Certificate), or recorded (Brown Border Certificate) including Native on Appearance and Native on Performance.

Crossbred Animal - An animal that is not registered or purebred.

Nurse Cow - Any cow nursing a calf to which she did not give birth.

Open Junior Show - An official junior exhibitor show with no designated club affiliated divisions. All junior exhibitors, regardless of club affiliation, shall compete together in the same classes.

Livestock - For the purpose of this competition handbook, Livestock shall be considered any animal that is entered, in competition or on exhibition at the Fair.

Breeding Animal - Any animal entered in a non-market class and intended for use in reproduction.

Special Rules Applying to the Open Barrow and Market Gilt Show

1. All barrow entries arriving on the fairgrounds must be officially weighed, tagged or tattooed, and scored.
2. Barrows will be weighed according to the time scheduled in the Competition Handbook, and will be weighed on the California State Fair scales. These scales, after being balanced and certified, are the only acceptable scales.
3. Re-weighing of barrows will only be allowed when the first weight taken is below minimum or above maximum. The second weight will be taken immediately following the initial weight, and the animal must be held in view of the weighmaster during this time. Second weight shall be final.
4. Any class which is too large to facilitate judging may be divided by weight into appropriately sized classes, as deemed necessary by the Fair Management.
5. No exhibitor may exhibit a barrow which has been sold through a fair livestock auction whether or not there is an actual change of ownership.
6. All barrows will be tagged or tattooed and scored at the time of official weigh-in.
7. Barrows may be weighed on the official State Fair scales during a prescribed time prior to the official weigh-in. Weighing will be supervised by the weighmaster and only one weight will be allowed.
8. All exhibitors must be at their pens at time of load-out.
9. Any barrows that are underweight or overweight will not be allowed to show.
10. Barrow show is not a terminal show.
11. No barrow shown in the Junior Show may be shown in the Open Show and vice versa.
12. The Fair reserves the right to weigh any barrow prior to entering the show ring or any time after the barrow is judged. All market barrows and gilts must be within 10 pounds above or below the official weight.

Rules Applying to Dairy Animals in Milk

1. Clean cows and clean hands during milking.
2. No milk produced in the barn is to be sold or given away on the grounds.
3. All rejected milk will be removed and disposed of off California State Fair premises.
4. Exhibitors will not be paid for milk.
5. With the cooperation of Babson Bros. Co., makers of milking equipment, State Fair has a Parlor with milking equipment. Milking will be done under the supervision of CDFA, Division of Animal Health and Food Safety Services, Milk and Dairy Foods Control Branch, and their rules will apply.
6. Cows may be subject to a C.M.T.
7. It is desirable that all milking cows be milked in the Milking Parlor. Exhibitors may use their own milking equipment in the barns when the parlor schedule becomes prohibitive. Milk from any cow not milked in the Milking Parlor must be removed from the fairgrounds or dumped at a site designated by State.
8. For milking hours inquire at the Milking Parlor. See attendant in charge.
9. All exhibitors' milking utensils must be stored out of sight when not in use.
10. All health and Residue Avoidance Program requirements will be enforced.
11. Dairy Cattle are not required to be tested and provide proof of a negative test within 60 days of the opening day of the California State Fair. (All TB requirements are subject to change.)

Fair Cattle Brand Inspection and Movement Requirements

Brand Inspection Requirements for Cattle Moving to the Fair

Cattle slated for a show/sale at a fair must have proof of ownership. Cattle arriving at fairgrounds without meeting inspection requirement cannot be sold and are subject to being held by the California Department of Food and Agriculture, Bureau of Livestock Identification.

Proof of Ownership Consists Of California-Origin Cattle

1. Brand Inspection Certificate in the Exhibitor's Name issued at time of original purchase; or
2. Saleyard Out billing in the exhibitor's name; or
3. Completed Bill of Sale to the exhibitor with a state brand inspector's authorization of release for inspection at destination. The request for verbal release must be made by the seller prior to the exhibitor taking custody of the animal and include the date, inspector's name and phone number. The animal may not be resold without physical brand inspection.

Out-of-State Cattle

1. A Brand Inspection Certificate in the exhibitor's name must accompany cattle originating from states requiring brand inspection.
2. Cattle originating from states not requiring brand inspection must be accompanied by a health certificate or original Bill of Sale in the exhibitor's name. If a Bill of Sale is used it must include the origin and destination, exhibitor's and seller's names, addresses, and phone numbers, and the animal's physical description including any identifying markings (California Food and Ag Code 21702, 21703).

Movement of Cattle to the Fair

A Bill of Sale or Consignment Form (yellow slip) is mandatory for each load of cattle and calves being transported. Fairs are encouraged to provide a Bill of Sale or Consignment Form to assist exhibitors in moving their animals to the fair (California Food and Ag Code 21054).

Brand Inspection Requirements for Cattle Prior to Sale

Cattle for sale at the fair must be brand inspected by a California Brand Inspector prior to sale (California Food and Ag Code 21051f).

1. Fairs must coordinate brand inspection date and process with the local brand inspector prior to the fair. The fair will be invoiced for the brand inspection fees of the sale cattle.
2. Cattle sold privately at the fair also require a state brand inspection. It is the seller's responsibility to arrange for inspection and pay the associated fee to the brand inspector.

Movement From the Fair

Non-Sale Cattle

1. A Bill of Sale or Consignment Form (yellow slip) must accompany breeding cattle destined to California location.
2. Non-sale market cattle should receive back their original brand inspection papers.

Sale Cattle

1. Junior Livestock Auction sales slip describing the animal, brand and brand location (Yellow slip is not required if the animal is going directly to processing); or
2. Copy of state brand inspector's Tally Sheet (going to processing); or
3. Individual animals' brand inspection slip (private sales).

Beef Promotion Fees

(\$1.00 per head sold at the fair) will be invoiced with the brand inspection fees for all cattle. California Department of Food and Agriculture will forward these fees to the California Beef Council. Local law enforcement and California Highway Patrol, in cooperation with the livestock industry routinely make vehicle stops for cattle inspection.

CATTLE TRANSPORTATION: NOTE: Local law enforcement and California Highway Patrol, in cooperation with the livestock industry routinely make vehicle stops for cattle inspection.

All cattle sold at auction on the Fairgrounds will be brand inspected prior to the auction. Cattle entering California require a brand inspection certificate from the State of origin. Cattle transported within California must carry a transportation slip. Cattle originating from a modified area in California require a brand certificate.

California State Fair Residue Avoidance Program

In an effort to increase awareness of responsibilities associated with the production of consumer oriented products, the California State Fair requires exhibitors of market animals to sign a Medication Declaration Form. It is also required that breeding animals on medication also declare such treatment on a Medication Declaration Form. If an animal requires medical treatment while on the fairgrounds, only a licensed veterinarian will be allowed to administer any drug, chemical or feed additive. An exhibitor may choose a licensed veterinarian other than the official State Fair veterinarian, but the official State Fair veterinarian **MUST** be notified in advance and he/she **MUST** be present. Furthermore, The Official State Fair Veterinarian, in agreement with Show Management, reserve the right to treat any animal if, in the opinion of the Official State Fair Veterinarian, it is in the best interest of the animal's health and well-being to be treated. All treatment costs are the responsibility of the exhibitor. All animals treated on the fairgrounds must submit a Medication Declaration Form. This form acknowledges the use of any substance in/on the animal for which the required withdrawal period has not completely elapsed prior to arrival at the Fair. This includes substances used per label or in an extra-label fashion. All extra-label drug usage **MUST** be done under the supervision of a licensed veterinarian and their contact information is required. Any animal requiring medically necessary treatment within 48 hours of competition may need to be withdrawn from competition if hydration status, mentation or gait will be affected by the necessary treatment. The intent of the program is not to prevent medically necessary treatment, but to insure the animal's well being and, fair competition. The decision of the Fair's committee in regards to eligibility for competition shall be final.

For 2016:

The California State Fair is continuing its Residue Avoidance Program and reserves the right to test any animal officially entered in any division at any time without notice, for foreign substance including but not limited to drugs, chemicals or feed additives.

Compounds tested for may include but are “not” limited to:

Antibiotics

Local Anesthetics

Non Steroidal Anti-Inflammatory Drugs

Diuretics

Sedatives/Tranquilizers

Steroids/Growth Promotants

Note to Parents/Legal Guardian, Leader/Supervisor

By signing the Detailed Receipt each parent/legal guardian acknowledges that:

1. He/she has read the California State Fair Junior Livestock Competition Handbook Rules (General, Livestock and Special) and Regulations;
2. The Junior Exhibitor has owned, fed and cared for the market animal(s) throughout the required ownership period. He/she has supervised the Junior Exhibitor and the Junior Livestock animal(s) have not had any drugs, chemicals, feed additives, or other substances used on them except pursuant to the label specifications, or unless under the direction and supervision of a licensed veterinarian for therapeutic purposes. All drugs, chemicals, feed additives or other substances for which the required withdrawal period has not elapsed prior to arrival at the Fair must be declared on a Medication Declaration Form at official weigh-in;
3. He/she has supervised the Junior Exhibitor and the Junior Livestock animal(s) have not been tampered with in any way, including but not limited to, unethical fitting or any method altering the natural conformation of any part of the animal(s) body;
4. He/she understands the penalties for violating these General, Livestock and Special Rules and Regulations, include but are not limited to, monetary penalties, and the immediate disqualification of the Junior Exhibitor.

Residue Avoidance Policy

The California State Fair reserves the right to test any animal officially entered in any division at any time without notice, for any foreign substance including but not limited to drugs, chemicals or feed additives as well as DNA testing. At a minimum, some animals from the following groups

will be tested: animals required to participate in the Sale of Champions (including any alternates) and; any animals suspect in terms of unusual physical appearance, demeanor or activity. As a condition precedent to accepting an entry, an entry form signed by the exhibitor, FFA (Agricultural Science) Instructor, 4-H Leader, Grange Advisor, Parent or Legal Guardian grants the California State Fair permission to test any entry.

Testing may be performed on any body tissue or fluid on both the live animal and the carcass.

Test samples collected from any animal must have zero tolerance for any identifiable or unidentifiable foreign substances including drugs (legal and illegal), chemicals of any kind or feed additives, unless established as permissible by the USDA or FDA or disclosed on the Medication Declaration Form.

If an animal has been administered a drug that is FDA approved for its species and class, sufficient time must have passed so that the animal does not test positive for that drug upon arrival at the California State Fair. Animals must remain free and clear of all drug and chemical residues while on show grounds unless being treated by the State Fair veterinarian or a licensed veterinarian while the State Fair veterinarian is present. Please note that elimination time (the time it takes for no drug residue to be found in the system) is generally longer than the labeled withdrawal time for most approved drugs.

The showing of any animal that has been administered during its life any quantity of any unapproved drug, chemical or medication is strictly prohibited. Such drugs include, but are not limited to, any diuretic, unapproved growth stimulant or other unapproved medication. Unapproved means not approved by the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) and/or the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) for slaughter animals including animals that may be destined for human consumption.

For 2016

If an animal that has declared a medication, receives an award and is eligible for the Sale of Champions, but is still within the withdrawal period of that medication then, the exhibitor shall be required to pay any boarding fees associated with the housing of livestock past the scheduled pro-

cess date. Boarding fees associated with waiting for test results on animals with a known residue, are all the responsibility of the exhibitor and shall be collected prior to auction, based on a per day cost per animal.

Animals testing positive to an unapproved foreign substance including but not limited to drugs, chemicals or feed additives, will be disqualified and declared ineligible to receive awards, premium money or sale proceeds. In addition to the disqualification and forfeiture of awards, premiums and/or auction proceeds, the State Fair may release to the media the name of the exhibitor, leader, advisor and the name of the exhibitor's animal that was disqualified and was in violation of the Drug Residue Program. The live market animal or carcass that tests positive will immediately become the property of the State Fair and the exhibitor may be compensated for the market value, less expenses, if the animal passes inspection. Carcass of disqualified animal or poultry will be disposed of per instructions by CAHFS if disposed of before entering the food chain or by written instructions from U.S.D.A. or FDA if already in the food chain. If entry is disqualified, the entry and/or the exhibitor will be declared ineligible and will not receive awards, premiums and/or any sale proceeds, further the exhibitor will be responsible for payment of all fees (including attorneys' fees), fines, and costs incurred by Cal Expo as result of the disqualification and any proceeding related to the disqualification; The owner/exhibitor and members of his/her immediate family may not be eligible to compete in subsequent California State Fair Programs. The extent and degree of future eligibility shall be determined by Fair management. If foreign substance residues including drugs, chemicals or feed additives are found in tissue of carcass of animals sold through the Sale of Champions, the California State Fair will in no way be liable or responsible for condition of carcass or sale price of animals.

If, for any reason, any part of a carcass must be removed by U.S.D.A. inspectors, sale price will be discounted accordingly.

Wholesome Assurance Statement

The use by non-veterinarians of animal drugs or other substances in any manner other than in accord with the labeling approved by the FDA is a violation of federal law.

Note: Abuse of the extra-label privilege by veterinarians is unethical and is subject to serious consequences such as license revocation. Any food animal must not exceed FDA/EPA/USDA established tolerances for any foreign substances including drugs, pesticides, feed additives or other chemicals.

Violative results of residue testing are subject to investigation by the USDA and FDA for prosecution.

Any misrepresentation of a food animal that can potentially affect the acceptability of the carcass or milk will be considered fraud.

Violations

If a Junior Exhibitor be found in violation of any of the Livestock Show rules, he/she and his/her family may be forever barred from showing at the California State Fair.

Post Mortem Examination: The California State may require a post mortem examination of any animal which dies at the State Fair. This will be performed by a licensed veterinarian at the expense of the exhibitor.

Notice to Junior Livestock Exhibitors

Residue Avoidance test fees: any fees related to testing any animal or carcass as required by The California State Fair, U.S.D.A or F.D.A. or food processor will be deducted from sale proceeds of the junior exhibitor.

Policy for 2016

If an animal tests positive on the original residue test screen, the exhibitor shall be responsible for paying for the confirmation test. If the exhibitor fails to pay or post fees for the confirmation test, the animal in question will be declared ineligible.

1. It is the policy and rule of the California State Fair that no animal which is entered for competition in the State Fair shall contain any trace residues of any substance which are not approved by the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) and/or the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) for slaughter animals, unless disclosed on the Medication Declaration Form.
2. It is the sole responsibility of the Exhibitor to insure that the animal is free of the above

- prescribed drugs and substances. Extent of knowledge on the part of the Exhibitor with regards to the drugs or substance found in an animal is not relevant to any issue, and it shall not be the defense that person or persons unknown introduced the proscribed substance into the animal prior to, or at arrival, or after arrival on the State Fair property.
3. Personnel (employees and contractors) of the California State Fair, other approved departments (and their representatives) within University of California at Davis, California Polytechnic State University, San Luis Obispo and Pomona, California State University at Fresno or Chico, Modesto Junior College, University of California at Davis Veterinary Medical Teaching Hospital, FDA, USDA, California Department of Food and Agriculture, California Department of Health or any other representative approved by the California State Fair reserve the right to take urine, blood, hair and other body tissue samples from any animal or it's carcass at any time without notice, for the purpose of determining whether there is any residue of any substance found within the body of the tested animal. The exhibitor, by entering his/her animal, expressly agrees that he or she will cooperate with the person or persons charged with the responsibility of taking the sample from the animal at the time of arrival, weigh-in, during the show or any other time the animal is on the California State Fair grounds. Failure to fully cooperate with testing procedures, and/or representatives collecting samples shall indicate a voluntary withdrawal by the Exhibitor of the animal from the competition, and result in the immediate disqualification of this project and automatic loss of participation privileges in all future California State Fair competitive events.
 4. All samples shall be taken by persons designated by the California State Fair and tested in an approved Laboratory. Reasonable care will be taken with regard to maintaining the purity and identity of the sample. The only chain of custody required will be that routinely relied upon by veterinarians practicing in and around the SACRAMENTO COUNTY REGION.
 5. As samples are taken, the Junior Exhibitor, a parent or legal guardian and/or a leader/supervisor shall be present to view the procedure. Upon collection of a sample, the Junior Exhibitor, and a parent or legal guardian or leader/supervisor shall provide their signatures to acknowledge that the sample was collected from the Exhibitor's animal.
 6. In the event that any animal is disqualified as a result of the violation of any of the rules found within the Residue Avoidance Program, or the animal is voluntarily withdrawn from the competition as a result of failure to cooperate with the testing procedures, then the Exhibitor shall immediately return awards and/or premiums previously presented. With regard to auction premium money, it shall be the option of the individual purchasing the disqualified animal to either donate the money to the Sale of Champions for the next year's use or donate the money to the California State Fair Scholarship Program, or upon request, receive a total refund of the auction premium money paid.
 7. By making entry in the California State Fair Livestock or Fur & Feathers program, the Exhibitor, a parent or both parent(s)/legal guardian(s) and project leader/supervisor agree to abide by this Residue Avoidance Program.

Animal Health Rules

General Rules for All Species

Veterinarians and veterinarian assistants provided by the Fair shall check all livestock upon arrival and before unloading for proper health certificates, signs of communicable disease, external parasites, unsightly disease conditions, and any wounds, open or closed, that may be contagious. Veterinarians and veterinarian assistants shall have the right to enter any pen or tie area to inspect an animal. Any animal found to be in an unsafe or unsightly condition will be quarantined in a designated area and then dismissed from Cal Expo facilities as soon as possible. The State Fair veterinarians' decision will be final. Specific health conditions that may warrant quarantine and/or dismissal are active ringworm, warts, soremouth, infectious scours or dysentery, pinkeye, lice, mites, footrot, infectious pneumonia and abscesses which are balding showing hair separation, open, draining or still scabbed. Animals having surgical sites resulting from abscess removal are unacceptable if they have sutures (stitches), scabs or are draining. Animals that are lame or injured will also be dismissed at the direction of the State Fair veterinarian. Healed skin conditions may be sufficiently unsightly to warrant dismissal.

Each exhibitor will receive a Veterinarian health check form upon completion of animal inspection. Each exhibitor will submit this form upon presentation of registration papers or animals will not be allowed to show.

(Lesions are considered active until skin is normal and hair regrowth is evidence.)

Cattle Health Rules

Cattle Entries from California

1. All female cattle twelve (12) months of age and over must bear evidence of official calthood vaccination against brucellosis with a legible, official tattoo visible in the right ear.
2. Owners of Purebred Registered cattle without brucellosis tattoos must present documentation certifying brucellosis vaccination, or written documents showing the animal has an exemption from CDFA, AHFSS.

Cattle Entries from Other States

1. All exhibition cattle entering California require official individual identification (ID), an Interstate Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (ICVI) obtained within thirty (30) days before movement into the state listing official ID and a California entry permit prior to entry.
2. Acceptable methods for Official Identification of cattle include:
 - a. Official brucellosis calthood vaccination tags
 - b. USDA metal "silver brite" tags
 - c. Tags conforming to Animal Identification Number (AIN) system (commonly known as an 840 tags)
3. It is unlawful to remove official identification.
4. Testing and/or vaccination requirements are:
 - a. All female cattle four (4) months of age and over must bear evidence of official calthood vaccination against brucellosis with a legible, official tattoo visible in the right ear.
 - b. All sexually intact dairy cattle six (6) months of age and over require a negative TB test within 60 days prior to entering California or must originate from a TB accredited free herd with documentation of the herd number and test date.
 - c. Cattle do not require a brucellosis test unless originated from states with a designated brucellosis surveillance area.
 - d. All bulls 18 months of age and over require a negative Trichomonosis test within 60 days prior to entry *except bulls for exhibition, confined to exhibition location, that will return directly to the state of origin after exhibition.*
5. Cattle from states with cattle scabies outbreaks should call CDFA, AHFSS for requirements.

Sheep and Goat Health Rules

Sheep and Goat Entries from California

1. All sheep and goats entering fairs require official individual identification that must be kept on the animals. Acceptable official identification includes:
 - a. Official USDA individual identification eartags
 - b. Premises eartags or legible premises tattoos (if they include a unique animal number)
 - c. Scrapie eartags
 - d. Legible registration tattoos in the ears (or tail-web of La Mancha goats) if accompanied by

- breed association registration papers
 - e. Electronic implants or Radio Frequency Identification Device (RFID)
2. It is unlawful to remove official identification.
 3. Fairs will not accept:
 - a. Animals from scrapie-infected flocks, scrapie source flocks, scrapie “non-compliant” flocks
 - b. Animals that are scrapie-positive, scrapie suspects or scrapie exposed unless they have been evaluated and approved for exhibition by the state scrapie epidemiologist.
 4. Fairs will keep records of the consignor, buyer, and animal identification for five (5) years when animals change ownership in a public sale at the fair.
 5. Fairs will try to accommodate Scrapie Flock Certification Program members with separate space if practical. Breeding animals should be housed in separate enclosures or locations from animals that are not in the certification program, if practical.
 6. Sheep or goats within 30 days pre-or post-parturition, or with vaginal discharge, shall if practical, be kept separate from animals from different flocks and in an area that can be properly cleaned and disinfected.

Sheep and Goat Entries from Other States

1. All exhibition sheep and goats entering California require official individual identification (ID), an Interstate Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (ICVI) obtained within thirty (30) days before movement into the state with a scrapie statement “The animals are not scrapie positive or suspect or from a scrapie non-compliant flock” and listing the official ID and a California entry permit prior to entry.
2. Acceptable official identification includes:
 - a. Official USDA individual identification eartags
 - b. Premises eartags or legible premises tattoos (if they include a unique animal number)
 - c. Scrapie eartags
 - d. Legible registration tattoos in the ears (or tail-web of La Mancha goats) if accompanied by breed association registration papers
 - e. Electronic implants or Radio Frequency Identification Device (RFID)
3. It is unlawful to remove official identification

4. Rams six (6) months of age and over imported into California require a negative Brucella ovis test within 60 days before entry OR originate from a Brucella ovis free flock. The ICVI must include the official ID number, test results, name of the approved laboratory, date of the test, or the “Brucella ovis free flock number”.

Swine Health Rules

Swine Entries from Other States

1. All exhibition swine entering California require official individual identification (ID), an Interstate Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (ICVI) obtained within thirty (30) days before movement into the state and listing official ID and a California entry permit prior to entry.
2. Acceptable forms of Official Identification include:
 - a. A tamper-resistant metal or plastic official identification eartag bearing the US shield and providing unique identification for each animal.
 - b. Ear notches or tattoos (ear or inner flank) if recorded in Purebred Registry Association Board with documentation attached to the ICVI
3. It is unlawful to remove official identification
4. No brucellosis or pseudorabies tests are currently required.

Vesicular Stomatitis (VS)

California import requirements specify that all horses, cattle, and swine originating from any state where vesicular stomatitis (VS) has been diagnosed, (except cattle and swine transported directly to slaughter), must be accompanied by a health certificate (certificate of veterinary inspection) and signed by an accredited veterinarian that includes the following statement:
 “The animals represented on this certificate have not originated from a premises or area under quarantine for vesicular stomatitis (VS) or a premises on which VS has been diagnosed in the past 30 days. I have examined the animals and have found no signs of VS.”

Open Livestock Entry Requirements

1. The California State Fair has implemented ShoWorks, an online entry program. ShoWorks is an industry standard used by over 50 fairs nationally. This user-friendly program can be trusted to accurately enter you into our competitions and allows for efficient communications via email. We are excited to have ShoWorks to better facilitate entering California State Fair competitions. Enter online at **CASStateFair.org**. Once you have completed on-line registration, print the Detailed Receipt, obtain all required signatures and return the signed form to our office by the required deadline. Entries are not accepted until Detailed Receipt is returned. Entries must be submitted no later than June 17, 2016. All entries hand delivered or mailed may be subject to a \$25 per exhibitor fee. Forms may be mailed to the California State Fair Entry Office, PO Box 15649, Sacramento, CA 95852.
2. Entries must be submitted on-line.
3. For information on entry fees, limit of entries, and premiums paid, see Class List for each species. Entry fees are not refundable.
4. A deficiency penalty of \$25.00 per entry must be paid if:
 - a. Applicable entry and pen fees are not received by the printed entry deadline. Entry forms must be received as required in Rule #1.
 - b. A check in payment of the entry fee is refused by the bank.
 - c. Insufficient information given, on entry form, as described in entry requirements 8 and 9 below.These penalties may only be paid by cash, certified bank check or money orders and made payable to the California State Fair.

6. No animal may be entered in more than one division in the Livestock Department unless provided for in the specifications of the division. Entries may not be transferred from one division to another unless fair management determines a need.
7. Failure to provide complete and accurate information on each and every entry on each entry form(s) by June 25, 2016 shall result in the disqualification of each entry missing all or part of the information required.
8. Animals not identified at least by birth date and at least one of the following: dam's name and her registration number, ear tag, tattoo or permanent marking or by the registration number prior to the closing date of entries may be made eligible only by paying a penalty of \$20.00 per entry. Only cash or certified cashiers check will be accepted as payment for these penalties
9. The registration number of the sire for the Get of Sire group and the registration number of the dam for the Produce of Dam group must be shown on the original entry form. Sires and dams not identified by the closing date may be made eligible only by paying a \$10.00 penalty per group entry. All animals in each group entry must be entered as individuals in a breeding animal class, and be of one breed.
10. All animals entered in group classes must have been entered and shown in individual classes, unless otherwise stated.
11. No entry will be judged if fees are outstanding on that entry, this includes NSF payments or other outstanding invoices from the past..
12. Exhibitors having fees and/or payments outstanding with the California Exposition and State Fair, may not participate until payments are made in full.
13. See Blocking Chute and Blocking Table Rules under Livestock Rules for registration information and fees. Generators are also subject to a \$35 fee.

Premier Breeder Award - This award to be made to the breeder of no more than 6 animals winning the most points in open single classes as listed below and including animals bred by him/her but exhibited by others. Both sexes must be represented, dairy cattle and dairy goats exception. No limit on number exhibited but award automatically figured on top 6 animals winning the most points. There must be at least two breeders competing for an award to be given.

Points will be calculated before any rule on limitation of awards is applied. At least three animals must be represented to win this award. Entry is not required for this award. Ties for Premier Breeder shall be broken by giving the award to the breeder/exhibitor ranking highest on the following list:

1. Breeder having the greatest number of Champions (Breed and Age).
2. Breeder having the greatest number of Reserve Champions (Breed and Age)
3. Breeder having the greatest number of 1st place awards.
4. Breeder having the greatest number of 2nd place awards.

Award: Banner

Premier Exhibitor

Premier Exhibitor Award - This award to be made to the exhibitor winning the most points on no more than 6 animals owned and exhibited by him/her in open single classes. Both sexes must be represented, dairy cattle and dairy goats exception. No limit on number exhibited but award automatically figured on top 6 animals winning the most points. There must be at least two exhibitors competing for award to be given.

Points will be calculated before any rule on limitation of awards is applied. At least three animals must be represented to win this award. Entry is not required for this award.

Ties for Premier Exhibitor shall be broken by giving the award to the exhibitor ranking highest

on the following list:

1. Exhibitor having the greatest number of Champions (Breed and Age).
2. Exhibitor having the greatest number of Reserve Champions (Breed and Age)
3. Exhibitor having the greatest number of 1st place awards.
4. Exhibitor having the greatest number of 2nd place awards.

Award: Banner

Premier Sire

Premier Sire Award this award to be made to the sire in each breed (in Swine, Sheep, Dairy Goat, Boer Goats and Beef Cattle only) whose Get wins the greatest total number of points in the regular individual classes except that the following conditions must also be satisfied:

1. There must be at least three exhibitors within the breed.
2. Points will be counted in individual classes only.
3. At least three different offspring of the sire must contribute points on which the award is based.
4. A sire will receive credit for points no matter who exhibits his offspring.
5. The Award will be presented to the exhibitor ranking highest on the following list:
 - a. The current owner
 - b. The last owner of the sire (if the animal is deceased)
 - c. The last among the exhibitors to own the sire (if the animal is alive)
 - d. The exhibitor owning the Get contributing the greatest number of points in winning the award
 - e. The exhibitor making entries first according to the order they are received.

Open Class Participation Statement American Angus Association

The American Angus Association®, 3201 Frederick Avenue, St. Joseph, Mo., will participate in premiums offered for open class Angus breeding cattle classes according to the premium schedule based on the number of head shown. The premium assistance provided by the American Angus Association for participation in this show is in addition to the premiums offered by the show itself. The premium assistance should not be used to offset show expense and shall be included in the premium payments distributed by the show to the exhibitors.

A minimum of 50 head must be shown in the open class division to receive American Angus Association premium participation for the following year.

Premiums from the Association are paid only to

registered Angus cattle and only if the registration number is a part of the show report provided to the Association. Therefore, all cattle should be registered at the time of entry to make certain they receive the Association's portion of premiums. The Association does not pay on championship or any group classes, (i.e. get-of-sire, junior get-of-sire or breeder six-head).

Exhibitors must have the original registration certificate issued by the American Angus Association available for inspection at the show for each animal or another current proof of ownership issued by the American Angus Association pedigree look up. Any animal, upon check-in, which does not have a legible permanent identification mark (ear tattoo marks, freeze-branded marks or hot-branded marks) corresponding to the permanent identification mark on the registration certificate, is ineligible to show. Once disqualified due to an incorrect or illegible permanent identification mark, animals cannot be re-identified (tattooed/branded) and rechecked at the show.

Any female shown with a calf at side: the calf must be the cow's most recent natural calf, and the calf must be registered by show day and have proof of registration at check in.

Only one person at a time shall lead an animal into the show ring.

Exhibitors who participate in shows that accept premium monies contributed by the American Angus Association are subject to the Association Rules as found in the Breeders Reference Guide of the Association. These rules are found in Part 2; Association Rules. The rules relating directly with the exhibition of Angus cattle are Part 2: Association Rules; Rule 800 Series; including Rule 800 - 810. These rules can be found at www.angus.org.

Altering the conformation and/or appearance of an animal for exhibition is prohibited. This includes the use of chin straps, covering of white skin, false tail heads (or use of any false hair), with the exception of false tail switches. The use of graphite, powders, hemp or other similar

substances used externally are also prohibited. Other prohibited products include those used internally such as steroids, illegal or unlicensed pharmaceuticals or artificial filling. Any animal found to be in violation will be barred from showing.

At any show for which the American Angus Association appropriates funds toward the payment of premiums, no exhibitors, individuals assisting exhibitors or member owners at such show shall be allowed to use any coloring agents, on any animal exhibited. The Association may adopt and implement various tests designed to monitor this prohibition, including but not limited to a "white towel" or "white glove" test. No aerosol cans or other pressurized containers will be allowed in designated line up areas.

All animals exhibited are subject to DNA marker or blood type test to verify accuracy of parentage as covered under the Association Rules and for other testing as required by the individual show.

Authorized representatives of the Association have the authority to enforce the rules set forth herein as well as in the Association Rules, including the barring of a registered animal from a livestock show at which it is to be shown, if there are reasonable grounds to believe a violation has occurred.

Any classes listed in this classification, which exceeds 15 head per class, should be broken into smaller classes. This should be accomplished by dividing the class as evenly as possible without splitting animals with the same birth date.

Example 1: If 16 head are entered in class 4, the class should be broken into two classes of 8; a class of 7 and 9; or a class of 10 and 6. Example 2: If 32 head are entered in class 4, the class should be divided into three classes consisting of two classes with 11 head and one class of 10 head or:

Special Rules

1. Animals must be registered in the International Brangus Breeders Association (IBBA) to be eligible to compete in an IBBA-sponsored show. The registration certificate (or photocopy) for each entry must be available for presentation to the Superintendent or show manager at the time entries are verified prior to judging.
2. The IBBA, and its representatives, have the authority to require such tests as they deem necessary to verify the accuracy of the classification and pedigree of exhibited Brangus animals. Said authority shall extend to, and cover the enforcement of, all show rules as adopted by the IBBA.
3. The registration number, permanent animal identification number (brand or tattoo), birth date and sire of each animal entered in an

individual class must be listed on the entry form.

4. Animals eligible to be shown in group classes must be entered and shown in respective individual classes.
5. Prior to check-in, heads of breeding animals must be clipped of all hair (including topknots) and be free of scars and/or slick spots.
6. Any animal found to have scurs and/or slick spots, or evidence of incisions, surgical or otherwise, in the following areas: head, testicles, sheath, navel or dewlap, will be disqualified from showing. Any animal upon check in which does not have a legible tattoo or brand corresponding to its registration certificate is ineligible to show. Once disqualified due to incorrect or illegible tattoo/brand, animals cannot be re-tattooed and rechecked at show. The brand/tattoo can be corrected and rechecked at the next available show.
7. Any Brangus animal recorded in the IBBA registry that has a "Parentage Dispute" listed in its first three-generation pedigree is ineligible for participation in Brangus shows and exhibitions. If the dispute is resolved, the listing will be removed from the pedigree and show eligibility will be restored.
8. In IBBA sanctioned shows, no animal may be shown that has been artificially filled with any amount of liquid at any time once the animal enters the grounds of a show. The fitter or ranch entity involved with an animal being artificially filled will be banned from the show ring for one year and the animal will be disqualified from exhibition at that particular show. The official show veterinarian may administer liquids orally, if so needed without disqualifying animal(s) from exhibition.
9. No animal may be shown that has had any foreign objects glued to or otherwise attached in a manner so as to alter its conformation or change its appearance. Tail ties and hair nets used on the tail and switch are the only exceptions.
10. Entries that have not complied with all of the above rules will not be eligible to show, to receive premium monies, or earn points in the IBBA's Show Sire of the Year, Show Bull of the Year, and Show Heifer of the Year awards.

11. All IBBA and IJBBA member will abide by the show rules as adopted. In addition, any show, fair, event or display in which Brangus cattle participate should follow these rules as adopted by IBBA. All Brangus entries are subject to the provision of a rule of the IBBA entitled "Inspection of Exhibits".
 12. Junior Livestock Exhibitors in Breeding Beef, Breeding Sheep, Breeding Swine, Dairy Cattle, Boer Goats, and Market Barrows that officially enter and show in the Junior Livestock Show are eligible to compete in the Open Show as long as the same exhibit/animal is entered and shown in the Junior Show and the same exhibit/animal is entered and met all Open Division entry deadlines and guidelines. 5. Any exhibitor desiring to dispute or challenge the results of any such test, exam, or show rule enforcement, as applied to his animals, shall do so in accordance with procedures established by the rules of the IBBA.

Appeal: An appeal from the decision of the veterinarian or designated association representatives designated by the I.B.B.A. under sections 1 and 4 of the Inspection of Exhibits may be made to the Executive Committee of the I.B.B.A. if the following requirements are satisfied: 1) the appeal is in writing and is signed by the appealing party; and 2) the appealing party files the written appeal with the I.B.B.A. Executive Committee as soon as possible after the veterinarian's or designated association representative's decision is rendered and in any event within six (6) hours of the time the veterinarian's or designated association representative's decision was made. If an appeal satisfying the foregoing requirements is filed with the I.B.B.A Executive Committee, the Executive Committee shall hold a hearing at which the appealing party and the veterinarian or designated association representatives whose decision is being appealed shall present statements and other evidence that are relevant to the matter, following which the Executive Committee shall render a decision which shall be final and conclusive.

Inspection of Exhibits

1. The IBBA and its representative have the authority to require such tests as they deem necessary to verify the accuracy of the classification and pedigree of exhibited Brangus animals. Said authority shall extend to and cover the enforcement of all show rules as adopted by IBBA.
2. Each exhibitor shall submit his or her registered Brangus cattle to such tests and examinations as requested and/or required by the IBBA, its authorized representatives, or those of the relevant show.
3. For and in consideration of the opportunity to participate in any Brangus function each exhibitor hereby releases the Association, its officers, directors and representatives from negligence, any and all claims, suits, and judgements past, present, or future, arising from or connected with the administration or use of such test or examination and the resulting decision there from.
4. Dental Inspection: All entries may be classified for judging on an age basis and should be entered in class according to age. Teeth may be inspected by a veterinarian designated by the I.B.B.A. in order to determine whether dental development is within allowable limits for the class so entered. If the veterinarian determines that in his opinion dental development exceeds maximum allowable limits, the animal shall

IBBA Blood Typing for Parentage Verification

Each Brangus animal for which an entry application or registration is received may be subjected to a DNA/blood typing test in order to verify both accuracy of parentage and DNA/blood type, according to Rules 1 and 2 of the International Brangus Breeders Association (IBBA) Inspection of Exhibits. At selected shows and fairs, blood samples will be taken from all division champions and reserve division champions for the purpose of verifying parentage and DNA/blood type. Staff or

representative of IBBA will supervise the collection of blood samples which can be taken at shows, fairs and events where IBBA contributes premium money or where IBBA staff personnel participate. Cost of the DNA/blood typing procedure will be paid for by IBBA. If a recorded parent is excluded (as a parent) as a result of DNA/blood typing, the owner of the animal may request, at his or her own expense, further determination of the actual parent. Failure to determine the sire and dam will result in the animal being listed in the IBBA Registry as a "Parentage Dispute," and the animal will be ineligible for future shows and exhibitions.

Animals must be either 75% Limousin (NALF percentage, not actual) or greater as indicated on orange NALF registration certificates or purple-papered Lim-Flex cattle as indicated by NALF registration certificates. Percentage, full-blooded, purebred and Lim-Flex cattle shall compete in the same classes and championships.
3. If a show does not abide by the NALF MOE Show rules exhibitors will not be awarded points for that show.
4. Animals must be properly tattooed and will be inspected at the show. Tattoos must be legible and match the registration certificates. If an animal's tattoo is not legible or cannot be read upon initial processing, it will be ineligible to show and not be allowed to return with a new or corrected tattoo.

- b. The addition of any hair or hair like substances, including false tail heads and false polls (false tail switches are allowed).
- c. The cutting, tearing or gluing of the hide or underneath the hide or removal of tissue in an attempt to alter the shape of the animal or the injection of any gas, solid or liquid under the hide to alter the normal conformation.
- d. Any products, solutions or liquids administered internally or externally to alter the conformation of the animal is prohibited. 3. All juniors are automatically entered in the Open Show by paying \$19 entry fee per entry, per class in the junior show. Juniors will be eligible for Open premiums excluding Open Production. To enter Open Group classes not offered in the junior show, Juniors must submit the \$21 entry fee, Open entry, and follow Open Show rules.
4. All Junior and Open classes shall be combined and judged together. Junior placings and award presentations shall be recognized, at the conclusion of each class, when juniors will be asked to lead out for special recognition.
5. Junior exhibitor animals must be registered in the name of that junior exhibitor and must be the project of said junior.
6. Junior exhibitor animals may only be used as part of an Open exhibitor's group entry when: (1) the junior exhibitors animal was bred by the Open exhibitor and the group calls for the animal in question to be bred by exhibitor; and (2) when the junior exhibitors animal is to be used to fulfill the owned by exhibitor requirement of the group class. In the case of

item #2 however, the junior exhibitor's animal must be housed and tested at the operation of the open exhibitor.

8. This competition is open to out-of-state juniors that meet California age requirements for 4-H and FFA. This show shall be open to all youth exhibitors. We encourage juniors to enter the Junior Boer Goat Show as well as the Open ABGA Show as they will be judged at the same time.
2. All Junior and Open classes shall be combined and judged together. Junior placings and award presentations shall be recognized, at the conclusion of each class, when juniors will be asked to lead out for special recognition.
3. All goats must be registered in the Herdbook of a recognized association before the opening day of the California State Fair. (July 8, 2016) Recognized associations include: ABGA, Canadian Boer Goat Association, International Boer Goat Association and The USBGA. The original registration certificate is required to be in the possession of the exhibitor the day of check in. Animals must be registered in the name of the exhibitor and must have been owned by the exhibitor on or before 30 days prior to the opening day of the show. Information on transfers is not acceptable. Goats must be registered in the JABGA member's name only. The ranch name cannot be listed under that.
4. Any female over 24 months of age or older that has not kidded and cannot prove current pregnancy will not be allowed to show.
5. All goats must have legible tattoo(s) or other means of permanent identification consistent with its registration certificate or the animal will be disqualified. If the animal has a microchip as its permanent identification, the exhibitor is responsible for providing a microchip reader.
6. Birth dates as listed on the registration certificate will be used to determine the class divisions. The show date (July 14, 2016) will be the base date in computing all ages.
7. All animals must be registered purebred, fullblood or percentage blood Boer Goats. Percentage doe classes are for goats 50% to 87.5% Boer; Fullblood classes are for does that are 15/16 blood (93.7%) and higher and 31/32 blood (96.8%) and higher for bucks. Progeny of fresh does will NOT be allowed in the ring. At the discretion of the judge and the superintendent goats may be let loose in the ring as a function of judging. The Champion and Reserve classes will be chosen from the first and second place animals in that division of the show.
8. Any goat showing any pronounced defect or abnormality will be barred from the show in any of the breeding classes. Artificial coloring will be a disqualification. Illegible tattoos or tattoos inconsistent with registration papers will result in disqualification.

 - a. Llama Best in Show - awarded to the best overall llama halter champion.
 - b. Alpaca Best in Show - awarded to the best overall alpaca halter champion.
2. State Fair Alpaca Champion. There will be one Champion and one Reserve Champion regardless of gender due to the decreased number of eligible alpaca entrants. Shorn Alpaca Fleece classes will be an open show, not ALSA.
3. Exhibitors shall not knowingly exhibit animals in any ALSA class (including performance and showmanship) that, in their opinion, exhibit unsoundness as described in the ALSA Handbook.
4. Judges shall not knowingly allow exhibition of animals in any ALSA class (including performance and showmanship) that, in their opinion, exhibit unsoundness as described in the ALSA Handbook.
5. Show Management shall not knowingly allow exhibition of animals in any ALSA class (including performance and showmanship) that, in their opinion, exhibit unsoundness as described in the ALSA Handbook. Show Management shall request exhibitors to remove animals from the fairgrounds that exhibit unsoundness or do not represent the best of the llama and alpaca community by their conformation, condition and/or attitude.
6. Every llama and alpaca will be inspected upon arrival and before unloading by an on-site veterinarian assistant.
7. All llamas 5 months and older entered in approved classes, must be registered with the ILR. All alpacas 5 months and older entered in approved classes must be registered with the ARI. EXCEPTION: Non-breeder llamas and alpacas entered only in youth classes do not have to be registered.
8. Non-Breeder animals are defined as geldings, vasectomized males, spayed or non-reproductive females all of which are

suitable for purposes other than breeding. A registration or veterinarian certificate verifying the above conditions must accompany these animals.

9. ILR or ARI registration numbers are required to be provided on the entry forms.
10. ORIGINAL REGISTRATION CERTIFICATES MUST BE PRESENTED TO MANAGEMENT WHEN THE ANIMALS ARRIVE AND BE AVAILABLE UPON REQUEST AT ANYTIME.

14. Junior exhibitors that officially enter and show in Junior Division classes at the California State Fair are eligible to compete in this event without jeopardizing their junior status. No other California Juniors will be eligible without jeopardizing their junior status. All juniors must officially enter and pay entry fees by the June 13 deadline. This competition is open to out-of-state juniors that meet California age requirements for 4-H and FFA.
15. All animals are subject to Livestock Rules and General Rules in the California State Fair Open Livestock Competition Handbook.
16. Exhibitors and Handlers are responsible for all other rules and regulations of this Competition Handbook.

18. All get and produce exhibited in Get of Sire and Produce of Dam classes must have been entered in and competed in individual halter classes. 32. Youth judging: There is no entry fee for this class. Sign up at check-in. **Do not** sign up online.
33. A youth exhibitor may choose to show in Adult Showmanship. In doing so, the Youth exhibitor shall not be permitted to enter any other youth llama showmanship classes at this or any other subsequent California State Fair.
34. A youth exhibitor may enter only one animal in each youth class, as the youth is awarded ALSA points in youth classes, not the animal. Rosettes through fifth place. Premiums are as listed in Youth classes.

California Exposition & State Fair

These rules are printed, mailed and posted on the fair's website in advance of the entry deadline(s). Each rule is subject to any action that may cause revision or curtailment at any time prior to each competition or judging. The most current General Rules will be found on the California State Fair website **CASStateFair.org**, under each competition. Upon signing the official entry form, either online or hardcopy, the exhibitor acknowledges that they have read and understand these rules and all others of the competition in which they enter and are further responsible for viewing, reading and understanding all revisions or curtailments on the fair's website prior to the competition. Exhibitors may request a copy of the most current rules by contacting the entry office:

Exhibitors Entry Responsibilities

Still Exhibits

1. All signatures and information necessary to determine that the exhibit is eligible must be submitted online and entry fees paid by Visa or MasterCard by the entry deadline. It shall be the responsibility of the exhibitors to correct all deficiencies in connection with entries or exhibiting which are required of them by the rules printed in the Competition Handbook. Entries will not be judged if deficiencies have not been cleared or fees paid.

Livestock & AG Mechanics

2. All signatures and information necessary to determine that the exhibit is eligible must be submitted online or on the entry form and all fees (including penalties) must be paid by the entry deadline date for Junior Livestock, Open Livestock, Best of Show and Small Animals. All Livestock, Small Animal, Best of Show and

Ag Mechanics exhibitors will be required to submit a **Detailed Receipt** with all required signatures within one week of entry deadline. It shall be the responsibility of the exhibitors to correct all deficiencies in connection with entries or exhibiting which are required of them by the rules printed in the Competition Handbook. A deficiency penalty of \$20 per entry must be paid for any deficiency or fees which have not been paid by June 25 for Livestock and Small Animals, this includes not returning the detailed receipt by due date. Entries will not be judged if deficiencies have not been cleared or fees paid. This rule shall apply to all equine shows with a requirement for their fees, forms and signatures being submitted by the entry deadline date within each equine section of any competition handbook.

Entry Limit

3. The State Fair management shall reserve the right to limit entries displayed and/or exhibited to facilities available and may limit the number of entries made by an exhibitor. Entries may also be limited or not displayed based on size, content, subject material, or for any reason determined not in the best interest of the California State Fair. Any return of entries under this rule will be done at the sole discretion of the State Fair management.

Ownership of Entry

4. Unless specific provisions are otherwise made in the Competition Handbook (printed or on the web), exhibitors must be the bona fide owner of their entries. The management may demand such proof of ownership as it deems necessary in each case.

Exhibitor Liability

5. Each exhibitor will be solely responsible for any consequential or other loss, injury or damage done to, or occasioned by, or arising from, any animal or article exhibited by him/her. Exhibitor agrees to indemnify, and hold harmless, the State of California, California Exposition & State Fair and all officers, agents, and employees there of

from all claims, demands, damages, costs, expenses, or liability costs suits or actions of every name, kind and description, brought forth from or on account of, injuries to death of any person including but not limited to workers, and the public, or damage to property resulting from the performance of the exhibitor or entries. Neither party shall request apportionment of liability by a jury.

No Guarantee

6. The State Fair cannot guarantee that all exhibition requirements of an entry can be provided (i.e. electricity, a showcase, a pedestal, special lighting, special location, total space requirements, water source, computer services, or any other special requirements).

Division/Class Cancellation

7. The State Fair management reserves the right to return entries and cancel any division or class in which, in its judgment, the entries are insufficient to secure adequate competition.

Entry Errors

8. Fair management is not responsible for finding errors in entries. Exhibitors are responsible for any and all errors which were submitted online or on entry and summary forms. No exhibitor shall be entitled to an award which has been disallowed as the result of his own error. The Fair management shall withhold the payment of awards for exhibits that are ineligible and may recover awards that have been paid for ineligible entries that are disclosed during post audits of Fair records. However, exhibitors with cause are entitled to question the validity of any disallowance. Such exhibitors should inform the Fair management immediately, in writing, giving their name, address, complete description of the entry and the reason for requesting reconsideration. Requests will not be considered later than ninety (90) days after receiving notice of disallowance.

Substitution

9. Substitutions may be made in still exhibits only in the same division of the original entry class of the original exhibitor, and may be made only if completed by the entry delivery date. Substitutions for livestock must be in the same division of the original entry by the original exhibitor. Substitutions must be made at time of check-in to avoid penalty. Fees may apply for substitutions in excess of two per division. The State Fair or the judge may disqualify or transfer to the correct class any entry which is not a true representative of the division or class in which it is entered.

Previously Entered Entry

10. Any non-animal (still exhibit) entry that has been exhibited at a previous California State Fair is not eligible for entry in the California State Fair. Once a still exhibit has been entered and judged at the California State Fair it cannot be reentered for competition in any California State Fair Competition.

Verification

11. Exhibitors wishing to verify that the State Fair has received submitted entry forms and fees must include a self-addressed/stamped postcard when submitting entry forms. Online submissions will receive a confirmation code once entries are submitted.

Responsibility

12. The Fair shall not be responsible for exhibits remaining on the fairgrounds after designated release times. All Still Exhibits or display elements remaining on the fairgrounds after designated release time will be treated as abandoned property and will be disposed of on or before September 1 of the same year.

Removal of Entries

13. An exhibitor may not remove his or her entry from the California State Fair once it has been accepted. Entries must be on exhibit at the official opening of the Fair or at any other time specified in the Competition Handbook and shall not be removed from the fairgrounds prior to the release date printed in the

handbook, except (at the discretion of the Fair management) in cases of positive evidence of sickness, accident and/or death, or other circumstances that are in the best interests of the Fair.

Dishonored Checks

14. A penalty of \$25.00 per dishonored check must be paid if a check for payment of entry fees or other applicable fees is refused by the bank. Only cash, certified check or money orders are acceptable for penalty payment.

Entry Fees

15. Entry Fees **ARE NOT REFUNDABLE.**

Late Entries

16. Late Entries may be accepted at the sole discretion of the California State Fair under the following conditions:

- a. Late Entries will not be accepted for California Creative Arts, Fine Art, Student Showcase, Photography, California Baking & Canning and Youth Baking & Canning.
- b. If the department accepts late entries, the completed entry form(s) and other completed required forms, signatures and full payment for all required fees must arrive at the California State Fair Entry Office (by Certified Mail or Hand Delivery) no later than five calendar days after the official entry deadline requirement of the competition. For example, if the Official Entry Deadline is June 17, the last day and time a late entry may be eligible is June 22 at 4:00 PM. If late entries arrive after 4:00 PM on that fifth day, they will NOT be considered.
- c. Open Livestock Late Entries will be accepted until July 1, 2016 with an additional \$100 per entry. Payment must be received no later than 5 pm on July 1, 2016.
- d. All late entries must be accompanied with the entry fee as listed within the program in addition to a late fee of \$20 per entry for all Junior, Open Livestock and Horse entries and a late fee of \$10 per entry for non livestock competitions and small animals (Fur and Feathers and dogs).

Acceptable forms of payment are Visa, Master Card, check or money order.

- e. No entries will be accepted beyond the capacity of the facility.
- f. All other entry requirements as well as any rules, regulations and schedules shall apply.
- g. No entry is a guarantee of acceptance and it is the exhibitor's responsibility to confirm that the fair has accepted any and all entries.
- h. The California State Fair expressly reserves the right to reject any and all entry forms for any reason whatsoever.

Design

17. The California State Fair assumes total design control over the presentation of the exhibits. Entries designed for hanging and not so equipped will be hung in a manner deemed appropriate by the Fair. No exhibit changes will be made once the entries have been displayed. Once an entry has been received by the Fair, no further handling of entry by exhibitor shall be permitted. Relocation and final placement shall be accomplished by Fair personnel. Entries requiring assembly/disassembly must include detailed instructions and sketches for assembly/disassembly. Instructions should indicate lifting points, unsecured parts and any other information required for such handling. Where necessary bank pins will be utilized to attach exhibits for display.

Juniors Entering Senior Department

18. All divisions and classes within Junior Departments are intended for Juniors exclusively. Entry into the Junior Department is regulated by age and youth organization requirements as outlined within this competition handbook. In no case may a person, group or organization outside of these age requirements (younger or older) be allowed to enter and compete in the Junior department.

However, Juniors may elect to enter, exhibit and compete (animal or non-animal) in the Senior Department when the rules of that department, division or class allow for such.

Such entries shall be restricted to:

- a. A class for the exhibit that is not provided in the Junior Department.
- b. Junior Livestock Exhibitors in Breeding Beef, Breeding Sheep, Breeding Swine, Dairy Cattle, Dairy Goats, Boer Goats, and Market Barrows that officially enter and show in the Junior Livestock Show are eligible to compete in the Open Show as long as the same exhibit/animal is entered and shown in the Junior Show and the same exhibit/animal is entered and met all Open Division entry deadlines and guidelines.
- c. Open classes or divisions that allows for participation of Juniors due to the open competition being a specialty, feature, regional or national show sanctioned by the fair and/or recognized organization. In this case, the Junior exhibitor must also enter and compete (with the same exhibit) in the current year's Junior department, division, class offered for the exhibit. This provision must be printed specifically within the rules of the feature show within this handbook.

19. Anyone under the age of 18 who meets the California State Fair age requirements and is planning to exhibit in a Senior department must have their parent or legal guardian sign their detailed receipt. If the exhibitor is required to be on the fairgrounds, the Junior must be supervised by their parent or legal guardian while at the fair.
20. Exhibit animals owned in partnership between Seniors and Juniors shall not affect the Junior's eligibility when the Senior partner is the exhibitor. When violations of this rule occur, the junior exhibitor will not be eligible to compete at the current and following years California State Fair.

Fair Employee Participation

21. No employee of the State Fair will be permitted to enter an exhibit for competition. No person shall be an exhibitor or sign an entry form as an agent in any Division or Department in which the exhibitor is a department head, judge, or paid employee.

Disqualification

Disqualification

22. The State Fair management shall reserve the right to vacate, declare ineligible for competition, and/or order the removal of any entry which is not in the best interest of the Fair, is unsightly, unhealthy, injured, lame, unsound, endangers public safety, violates the Fair's Animal Welfare Policies, or has been entered in violation of these rules and regulations.

Entry Disqualifications/Transfers

23. A complete exhibit eligible in more than one Division and/or Class shall be entered and judged only in the Division and/or Class for which it best qualifies. The State Fair or the judge may disqualify or transfer to the correct Class (at his/her discretion) any exhibit which is not a true representative of the Division or Class in which it is entered. It is not, however, the responsibility of the State Fair or judge to transfer an entry to the correct Division and/or Class.

Disqualifications

24. In the event an entry or an exhibitor is disqualified for any rule or policy violation (including but not limited to practices or procedures that are unethical, those in violation of the Fair's Residue Avoidance Program, DNA Testing Program and those not adhering to the Fair's schedule for the program), any or all of the following actions may take place:
 - a. The entry or exhibitor that is disqualified will be declared ineligible and will not receive awards, premium money and/or any sale proceeds. Further, the exhibitor shall be responsible for payment of any fees, fines due or costs incurred by the State as a result of disqualification.
 - b. The owner/exhibitor and members of his/her immediate family will not be eligible to compete in subsequent California State Fair Programs. The extent and degree of future eligibility shall be determined by Fair Management.

- c. Fair Management reserves the right (but does not guarantee) to move entries up in placing after judging has taken place when an award void is created by a disqualification. This process of moving up judged entries shall only take place, however, when it is clear what the judge's placing would have been had the disqualified entry not been in competition. For example, when a Champion is disqualified, the Reserve shall move up and be named the Champion; however, no other changes shall take place below the Reserve Champion. The same shall apply in the case of a class, section or division winner when 2nd place has been clearly indicated by the judge. If it is not possible to clearly determine a new placing, no change shall take place. When a placing change does take place the entry moving up will receive all the awards, appropriate titles and all premiums of the disqualified entry but will not receive any of the original placing awards or premiums won in the second category. In other words 2nd place will now receive 1st money and "no" entry will receive 2nd money.

Cooperation

25. Exhibitors, their immediate family, leaders, advisors and agents thereof, not cooperating with security personnel or any other Fair officials in all matters of policy, including but not limited to parking, stall/pen/space assignments and appearance, judging and/or animal care will have their entries cancelled and will be ordered to remove their exhibit from the grounds immediately and forfeit all awards, premium monies and sale proceeds. Failure to adhere to this rule will result in being banned from the State Fair.

Public Disturbances

26. Exhibitors causing public disturbances, those who are uncooperative and/or unsportsmanlike, those not following good animal welfare practices as determined by management, or those found in violation of rules or in practices unethical or inimical with

the Fair program and/or policies/procedures shall be penalized by forfeiture of premiums awarded, any and all awards, payments of fines and/or damages to State Property, privileges, and/or disqualification at this or subsequent State Fairs as may be deemed appropriate by the Fair Management and/or the Board of Directors. Further, if the exhibitor and/or exhibitor's adult supervisor, parent or family member's actions are deemed to be illegal, inhumane or unethical to livestock, the proper authorities will be notified for further investigation by those agencies for possible prosecution and/or civil penalties.

Probation

27. Any exhibitor found in violation of any rule may be placed on probation for a period of one year or longer if Fair management deems appropriate.

Judging

Judging

28. The judge(s) shall award first, second or third place, etc., according to merit and if without merit the judge shall make no award under any circumstances. This rule applies whether there are one or more entries in the class.

Judge/Exhibitor Information

29. No person shall act as a judge in any Division in which he/she or a member of his/her immediate family is an exhibitor, is in charge of an exhibit or division, in charge of a group of exhibitors, or is a member of a group of exhibitors.

Judge/Fraternization/Criticism

30. Judges should avoid unnecessary fraternization with exhibitors. No person shall be allowed, under any circumstances, to interfere with the judge, or judges, during their adjudications, or with the Fair's staff, or to offer any criticism of any exhibit of another. Violators of this rule shall be excluded immediately from the judging area and from competition and be subject to such additional penalties, including cancellations of awards, as the State Fair management shall consider appropriate.

31. No exhibitor shall receive more than two cash awards in any one class. For the purpose of this rule only, a husband, wife, and unmarried children (including foster children) under 18 years of age shall be considered as being one exhibitor, except that brothers and/or sisters shall be considered as being separate exhibitors in Junior Department classes. This rule shall have no bearing on consideration in the placing of entries by judges. Ribbons shall be presented in the order of placing by the judges. The management shall, however, pay third money to fourth winner, etc., when the third winner is prohibited from receiving third cash award under the provisions of this rule. (Any entry or exhibit in which one or more members of the family described above has a financial interest shall be included in the limitation of not more than two cash awards per class.)

32. Management reserves the right to combine or to divide classes in a manner it deems necessary in order to assure adequate competition. In the event of a show change, as a result of this rule, or where classes are established after the close of entries, premiums and awards will be distributed, divided or eliminated in a manner as deemed necessary by Fair Management.

Judge's Decision

33. The judge's decision is final. The judge's decision cannot be protested.

Chief Judge Policy

34. A Chief Judge will be assigned by the Fair, for still exhibits only, to mediate in the event there is a conflict during the judging process. All decisions of the Chief Judge shall be final and may not be protested.

Protests

35. For still exhibits and horse only - Any protest must be submitted in writing and given to the Fair's executive staff member responsible for the Competitive Program in question within 24 hours of the time of the cause of the protest. Protests must be based on a violation of rules. The judge's decisions on awards cannot be protested. No protest shall be considered by the management unless accompanied by a deposit of \$100.00

(Cash, money order or certified check). The deposit shall be forfeited if the protest is not upheld. Protests shall be adjudicated by Fair management. Fair management will consult with a member of the California State Fair Board of Directors who shall be designated by the Chairman of the Board. The decision of Fair Management shall be final and unappealable. See special livestock rules for protests in the Livestock Program.

Rejudging

36. Under no circumstance will any entry which has been previously judged be "rejudged" due to the disqualification or removal of another entry.

Awards

Special Awards

37. Special Awards contributed by businesses or individuals are offered in some California State Fair Competitive Programs. These Special Awards are the obligation of the contributor/donor. The California State Fair is not responsible for redemption of these awards.

Tax Laws

38. It is the responsibility of the exhibitor to investigate and adhere to State and Federal tax laws/regulations regarding premiums paid and awards received. As an out-of-state payee who earns \$1500 or more, we must withhold 7% for State taxes. You can request an exemption or a reduction of this withholding by filling out and submitting the Nonresident Withholding Waiver Request, California Form 588.

Premium Awards

39. Awards, ribbons, tags or cards have no value as payment. Premiums are paid only from the records of the judges sheets. Premium checks will be issued as soon as auditing, drug testing, if applicable, and processing can be completed. If checks are not received by November 15, please phone or write the State Fair. Checks must be cashed within six months of the date of issue. Exhibitors have until December 31 of the same year, to claim checks returned to the State Fair. Checks will not be reissued after this date.

Age Requirements

Junior Exhibitors Membership Age and Affiliation Requirements

40. Organization affiliation requirements:

If a Junior (youth) exhibitor has been a member of a junior organization for 60 days immediately prior to the opening date of the State Fair (May 9, 2016), and their project or entry was produced or conducted at anytime during the year of 2016 under the supervision of the organization, the Junior must enter the divisions or classes designated for that organization. If, however, the project or entry was not produced or conducted under the supervision of the organization, the Junior must enter as an Independent Junior for that project or entry. Example: If a 4-H member wishes to enter a Market Steer competition and a baked goods competition, in a situation where, they are only enrolled in a 4-H Beef project, the entry is as follows: Enter 4-H for the Market Steer competition and Independent Junior for the Baked Goods competition (even though the exhibitor is a 4-H member, the baked goods project was not produced or conducted under the supervision of the organization).

41. Non-designated "Junior" shows or divisions: If a show or division offered is not specified as 4-H or FFA, Junior exhibitors who are enrolled in a 4-H or FFA project relating to that show or division must still enter as members of their respective organizations and follow all applicable rules and regulations of the department.

42. All 4-H exhibitors must be 9 years old by December 31, 2015 and not be older than 19 years old as of December 31, 2016. Exhibitors must also meet age and membership requirements of their organizations when entering as a member of an organization. Exhibitors must also meet ownership and all other requirements of the competition to be eligible for entry.

43. California Grange: California Grange youth shall be considered Independent Juniors for Livestock, Dairy, Small Animal and Still Exhibits.

Independent Junior and Grange Age Requirements

44. (This rule applies to Indoor non-animal Exhibits only)

Independent Junior and Grange exhibitors may enter California State Fair classes and divisions in indoor (Still Exhibit) competitions if they are 5 years old as of January 1, 2016. Independent exhibitors are eligible to compete/exhibit through December 31 of the year in which they turn 18 years of age. Grange exhibitors are eligible to compete/exhibit through December 31 of the year in which they turn 19 years of age. Exhibitors must meet ownership and all other requirements of the competition to be eligible for entry.

FFA Age Requirements

45. The first year of eligibility will be determined by the FFA advisor; however, exhibitor must have graduated from the 8th grade as of July 1, 2016. FFA requirements allow exhibitors to enter FFA classes through the year following the year in which they graduate from high school.

46. Independent Still Exhibits Exhibitors: Persons, who are "not" 4-H, FFA or Grange members may enter the Junior competitions provided they meet age requirements for youth exhibitors in the competition they are entering. These Juniors are considered Independent Juniors and must enter Independent Junior classes or divisions when the classes or divisions are designated as such in the Indoor (Still Exhibits) Competitions. Exhibitors who enter Independent of an organization must not be older than 18 years old as of January 1, 2016.

Independent and Grange Animal Exhibitors:

47. Persons who are "not" 4-H or FFA members may enter the Junior Livestock Show provided they meet age requirements for animal exhibitors at the State Fair. These Independent exhibitors shall enter 4-H or FFA classes as follows:

- a. Independent Junior exhibitors who are 13 years of age or under (as of show day) shall compete in the appropriate 4-H divisions only.

- b. Independent Junior exhibitors who are 14 years of age (as of show day) or are incoming freshmen in high school shall be placed by Fair Management in either 4-H or FFA divisions.
- c. NEW: Independent Junior exhibitors are eligible to enter 4-H or FFA Showmanship. Independent Juniors are not eligible for County or Chapter Groups or Outstanding Exhibitor.

Member Standing and Ownership Requirements

48. Juniors who are members of 4-H, FFA or Grange must be in good standing with their organization and projects entered as such must have been conducted under the supervision of the organization and must be owned by the exhibitor (unless otherwise stated).

Eligibility Questions

49. Any questions as to the eligibility of an entry shall be determined by the exhibitor's advisor (for 4-H, FFA or Grange) instructor (for Industrial & Technology Education) or parent or guardian (for Independent Juniors). Not with standing the foregoing, the State Fair shall make final determination of eligibility in all cases.

4-H Age Requirements:

- 50. The levels of membership for 4-H aged based. Each level is defined as follows:
 - a. Primary Level: Must be 5 years old as of December 31, 2015. Primary membership ends when members qualify as junior members. Exhibitors who are under 9 years of age on or before December 31, 2015 are not eligible to compete in animal competitions at the California State Fair.
 - b. Junior, Intermediate & Senior: Must be 9 years old by December 31, 2015. Exhibitors are eligible to compete/exhibit through December 31 of the year in which they turn 19 years of age.
 - c. Home Schooled Children: Age criteria, as listed in 1 and 2, only will apply to home schooled children. Grade level will not be a consideration. (Exhibitors who are under 9 years of age as of December 31, 2015 are not eligible to compete in animal competitions at the California State Fair.)

Independent Junior and Grange Age Requirements

51. (This rule applies to Animal Exhibitors)

Independent Junior and Grange animal exhibitors must be 9 years old as of January 1, 2016 and are eligible to compete through December 31 of the year in which they turn 19 years of age. Independent Juniors and Grange exhibitors shall enter 4-H or FFA animal classes.

No Dual Affiliation in Competition

52. Under no circumstances may an exhibitor show the same species or project in more than one Division of the Junior Department.

Adult Supervision Requirement

53. All Junior exhibitors, required to be on the State Fairgrounds, must be accompanied and supervised by an adult while on the State Fairgrounds. Instructors, advisors, leaders and other adults in charge of Junior exhibitors shall be responsible for their conduct at all times.

FFA Supervision Requirements

54. All FFA exhibitors entered as such must be supervised by their agricultural instructor. Any deviation from this rule must be taken up with the State Agriculture Education unit representative in charge. The CATA Curricular Activities Code shall govern the conduct and eligibility of FFA exhibitors and their projects.

Uniforms

- 55. Uniform requirements for Independent youth shall be the same as required for 4-H and FFA members excluding insignia. The official show uniform for animal exhibitors at the California State Fair will be white pants, trousers or dress and a white blouse or shirt.
 - 56. No exhibit owned by a chapter or club, or conducted, as a joint project by two or more individuals is eligible in the Junior Department unless the division/class specifically states.
- Free Speech

Free Speech Activities Guideline

57. The California Exposition & State Fair (Cal Expo) hereby finds that these guidelines are intended to set forth in writing Cal Expo's long-standing policy governing the conduct of Cal Expo employees and exhibitors, as well as members of the public, under the First

Amendment to the United States Constitution and Article I of the California Constitution, on Cal Expo's grounds. These guidelines are not intended to enlarge upon nor create any rights guaranteed by existing law nor waive any defense or rights available to Cal Expo, nor do they represent any admission that the facilities of Cal Expo are open as a public forum. It is the policy of Cal Expo to allow within the parameters set forth herein, reasonable access to its grounds and designated free speech expression zones for demonstrations for free speech activity as allowed by the First Amendment to the United States Constitution and Article I to the California Constitution.

For further information regarding Free Speech Activities at the California Exposition & State Fair please write to: Chief of Police, California Exposition & State Fair, P.O. Box 15649, Sacramento, CA 95852.

Miscellaneous

58. Should contractors, associations, clubs or individuals desire to arrange for beverages and food services, all such arrangements must be coordinated through Ovations/FanFare, the State's Master Food & Beverage Contractor. No exceptions. Contractor shall be responsible for expenses related to these services, if any. Alcoholic beverage service areas/facilities will only be allowed in designated locations. Only persons 21 years or older will be allowed to consume alcoholic beverages. Further, no alcoholic beverages may be brought onto the grounds. These products may only be acquired at Ovations/FanFare locations of the grounds. Individuals that endanger themselves or others will be reported to authorities.

Definitions

59. The following definitions apply to this handbook

American System of Judging: Each entry in a class is judged in comparison to the other entries in the class. Entries are placed first, second, third, etc. according to relative merit. There will be no more than one first, second, third, etc. per class.

Danish System of Judging: Each entry in a class is judged on its own merit. Entries are placed first, second, third, etc., depending on points received based on the score card. There may be more than one first, second, third, etc. per class.

Senior Departments: California Fine Art, California Crafts, California Baking & Canning, Student Showcase, Photography, Commercial Wine, Commercial Craft Brew, Home Brew, California Cheese, California Olive Oil, Open Livestock by species and Open Small Animals by species.

Junior Departments: Youth Arts, California Youth Baking & Canning, Student Showcase, Photography Junior Livestock by species and Junior Small Animals by species.

Senior/Open Exhibitor: An exhibitor who is no longer eligible to be a Junior Exhibitor or enter a Junior Department.

Junior Exhibitor: An exhibitor who is a member of 4-H, FFA, Grange, or an Independent Youth Exhibitor who meets the requirements of Independent Junior divisions offered. See specific show and General Rules for exceptions to this definition.

Entry Office: The California State Fair Entry Office is located at 1600 Exposition Blvd., Sacramento. Contact may be made by phone, mail, email or personal contact. Questions regarding competitions may also be directed to the Entry Office. (916) 263-3149 - entryoffice@calexpo.com.

Still Exhibits: All competitive exhibits which are typically indoor and not involving animals, such as art, quilts, foods, crafts, sewing, metal work, jewelry, graphics, drafting, sciences, etc.

Livestock & Small Animals: All competitive exhibits which animals are the entry; such as beef, sheep, swine, dairy cattle, goats, llamas, cavies, rabbits, poultry, dogs, etc.

Online Entry: Combines the Summary Form and Entry Form for the department and allows exhibitor to pay fees and submit entries online.

Entry Form: An official form used in submitting an entry in the California State Fair (All Competitions).

Summary Form: An additional official form identifying the exhibitor used in submitting an entry in the California State Fair Competitions (California Creative Arts, California Baking & Canning, Student Showcase, California Youth Baking & Canning, Open and Junior Livestock & Open Livestock).

Detailed Receipt (formerly known as Signature Acquisition Form (SAF): An official form used in submitting an entry/exhibit in the California State Fair when entry/exhibit was entered online. The Detailed Receipt is only required for Open and Junior Livestock, Fur & Feathers, Best of Show and Ag Mechanic exhibitors.

Entry Fees: A fee charged to enter a competition. All entry fees must be paid online when entries are submitted. If entries are mailed or hand delivered, there may be a processing fee added to your entry fees.

Entry/Exhibit: Terms used to define the item entered in the competition or contest.

Entrant/Exhibitor: Terms used to define the person entering the competition.

Premium: A cash award given to winners of a competition.

Department: Competition you wish to enter, ie, California Crafts, Fine Art, Youth Arts, etc. which is comprised of similar shows.

Shows: Generalized sections of a competition.

Division: Categories within a show.

Class: Specific categories within a division.

Competition Handbook: a printed or electronic (web) book, prospectus, or flyer which contains information for entry into the California State Fair competitions. Competition Handbooks can be a printed document or as an electronic document found on the California Exposition & State Fair website **CASStateFair.org**.

Bonafide Ownership of Exhibit - ownership is the state or fact of exclusive rights and control over property considered an entry or exhibit. This definition includes livestock, small animals and horses although not limited to that type of property. Objects/products created or produced are also included as well as intellectual property. Proof of such ownership may be required by management.

Admission and Parking

Livestock Exhibitors Credentials

The State Fair has an exhibitor credential policy which will make additional exhibitor credentials available for a nominal fee. Each exhibitor will receive one exhibitor credential at no charge upon check-in at the Livestock Office. Credentials will be provided for entire show period only (These will be called limited season credentials).

Additional credentials may be purchased at a rate to be determined before opening day of the Fair. These credentials may be purchased from the Box Office after obtaining an authorization form from the Livestock Office upon arrival at the Fair.

4-H leaders responsible for exhibitors will receive one admission credential at no charge and good for the length of the junior show. 4-H County I.D./leader cards must be presented prior to receiving credential.

FFA advisors will receive one admission credential good for the length of the junior show. All advisors must be approved through the CATA representative at the State Fair.

These credentials are good for the length of the Show.

Livestock Parking Permits

Each exhibitor will receive one parking permit (limit of one free per family) at no charge upon check-in at the Livestock Office. Additional parking permits may be purchased at a rate \$6.00 per day, maximum of one per family.

Parking permits include in and out privileges. These additional permits may be purchased from the Box Office after obtaining an authorization form from the Livestock Office upon arrival at the Fair. Parking permits allow parking in designated parking lots ONLY, and are good for the length of the Show. Parking permits must be visible in the windows of all vehicles and stock trailers on the grounds. **NOTE: A stock trailer parking area will be designated for Livestock Exhibitors. It will be in Z lot. All trailers and/or trucks will be parked in this parking area. Contact the Fair office for specific information.** Vehicles with parking permits also have access to the barn area after 10:00 p.m. and before 8:00 a.m. All vehicles must be removed from the barn area to designated parking lots by 8:00 a.m.


4-H leaders responsible for exhibitors will receive one limited season parking credential (limit of one per family) at no charge good for the length of the show period. 4-H County I.D./leader cards must be presented prior to receiving credential.

FFA advisors will receive one limited season parking credential (limit of one per family good for the length of the show period. All advisors must be approved through the CATA representative at the State Fair.

Overnight Camping

Exhibitors with campers, trailers and or motor homes, must camp in their vehicles in the R.V. Park only. There will be NO parking area without hook-ups. R.V. spaces are \$650 for the State Fair season, July 5 to August 4, 2016 or \$40 per day, or \$225 per week for full hook-ups with 30 or 50 AMP service. To apply for R.V. Space, please complete an R.V. Park application and return with rental fee to the R.V. Park Office - Trailer Space Rental, California Exposition and State Fair, P.O. Box 15649, Sacramento, CA 95852-1649. **All R.V. Park applications and payments must be received by June 25, 2016.**
